April is Testicular, Esophageal Cancer and Oropharyngeal Cancer

All of these cancers are most common in men

Testicular Cancer

Although testicular cancer can happen at any age, it is the most common cancer in men ages 15 to 35. White men are more likely to get testicular cancer than other races or ethnicities. It's also one of the most curable cancers.

Other things that increase a person's risk for testicular cancer:

Risk factors include having undescended testicles (cryptorchidism), hypospadias, a personal or family history of the disease, HIV/AIDS, and certain genetic disorders.

Oropharyngeal Cancer

Oral cavity cancer starts in the mouth. It might also be called oral cancer. Oropharyngeal cancer starts in the middle part of the throat just behind the oral cavity.

These cancers are more than twice as common in men as in women. They are slightly more common in White people than Black people.

Risk factors include tobacco use, alcohol use, Genetic syndromes such as Fanconi anemia and Dyskeratosis congenita and HPV Infection

Esophageal Cancer

Cancer of the esophagus (also called esophageal cancer) starts when cells in the lining of the esophagus begin to grow out of control.

Esophageal cancer is more common among men than among women. The lifetime risk of esophageal cancer in the United States is about 1 in 127 in men and about 1 in 434 in women.

Risk factors include having Gastroesophageal reflux disease, Barrett's esophagus, Injury to the esophagus, and HPV Infection
