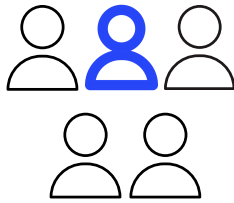


COLORECTAL CANCER

1 in 5



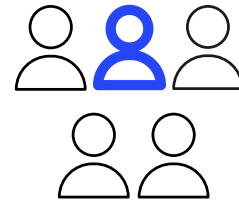
colorectal cancer diagnoses are in people younger than 54.
